In 2022-23, community engagement has helped to inform policies, processes and delivery outcomes for projects.

For example, a commitment to invite our community to help us develop key documents such as a Sustainability Strategy and a Local Planning Strategy.

We continue to move forward with the Precinct Structure Plan for our Town Centre.

We have also seen the progression of the Local Planning Policy 32 - Community Benefits. The Town of Mosman Park is leading the way with the development of this policy as it will provide a framework to guide community benefit contributions from developers where discretion is sought.

### Our services

### Facilities and Infrastructure

### Strategic Community Plan (SCP) alignment

The Town manages its assets in an economically, environmentally, culturally, and socially responsible manner, supporting a range of services that enrich the lives of current and future residents.

### 2022-23 in review

### **Asset Management**

Alf Adams Pavilion has undergone an interior flooring replacement, installation of a wall mounted hot water unit, and a full lighting replacement. Additionally, we have initiated plans for a fence installation.

We continued our program of improvements to footpaths, street reconstruction, kerbing, and drainage during 2022-23.

### **Traffic management**

New traffic counters have been installed on our local roads to assist in identifying speeding issues and enable us to work closer with Western Australian Police by reporting speeding patterns. This investment will also capture up to the minute traffic data statistics within our network. Ultimately these measures will help Mosman Park access Black Spot and Roadside Project Grant funding.

#### Leases

The Memorial Hall lease with Mosarts came to an end in early 2023. Negotiations for a new lease began shortly after with a new prospective head tenant. The team utilised this period of transition to complete various maintenance works to the heritage building and preserving its excellent condition.

### **Grant Funding**

#### Roads to Recovery (RTR)

Fairbairn Street was resurfaced using the 2022/23 RTR grant funding.

### Metropolitan Regional Roads Group (MRRG) Road Rehabilitation Projects Program

Grant submissions for rehabilitation of Wellington Street (from Solomon Street to Moyhnihan Mews) and McCabe Street (from the Town's boundary to Beagle Street), were approved. These projects will be constructed during the 2023/24 financial year.

Footpaths and kerbing were replaced in Dover Court. Additionally, kerbing along a section of Wellington Street was undertaken with a combined budget value of \$60,000.

### Parks and environment

### **SCP** alignment

Mosman Park is home to over 30 parks and beautiful natural sanctuaries, encompassing bushland remnants and riverbank environments. With a unique variety of landscapes, soil types, flora and fauna species, we strive towards the preservation and enhancement of our natural environment and parklands for the community to use and enjoy.

#### 2022-23 in review

The past 12 months have seen a continued focus on supporting the Town's urban forest through various planting projects in natural areas, parks and in streetscapes. 250 new street trees were planted during the winter seasonal planting period.

### **Planting**



**5065 plants** were planted in 13 natural area sites across the Town of Mosman Park's natural areas.

We would like to thank groups such as Friends of Mosman Park Bushland, Bird Park and Genders Park, our community, and schools including Christchurch Grammar and Scotch College for contributing to our 2022-23 planting effort.

#### Grants

The Town was successful (along with the City of Fremantle and Fremantle Ports Authority) in our 2023/2024 Coastal Adaptation and Protection (CAP) Grant for \$33,890.

This funding will ensure the Leighton and Mosman Beaches Coastal Monitoring Program continues. This monitoring informs our Coastal Hazard Risk Management and Adaptation Plan that outlines future climate change impacts on Mosman Beach.

### Waterwise program

The Town was re-endorsed as a Gold Waterwise Council in 2022-23.

This was possible through actions such as:

- giving residents access to subsided native plants, which need less water
- extending the ecozone area at Buckland Hill and reducing the amount of watered turf.

### 2022-23 projects

- Following community consultation, Stringfellow Park was upgraded with new shade sails, a revamped nature play space and a basketball/netball ring.
- The existing bore at the Town's depot was re-constructed to enable greater efficiencies in supplying groundwater to irrigate surrounding parkland and verges.
- The old bore pump at Rope Works Park was replaced.
- 280 m of bollards were installed along the new cycle path on Curtin Avenue to protect recent planting.
- Davis Oval was upgraded with new sports lighting to provide an improved and safer training environment for junior soccer players.



### Waste and recycling

### **SCP** alignment

The Town of Mosman Park is committed to providing sustainable waste management services that reduce waste generation and encourage reuse and recovery.

### 2022-23 in review

We collected a total of 3,610 tonnes of waste from kerbside bins, comprising 1,891 tonnes of general waste, 891 tonnes of recycling, and 827 tonnes of garden organics. This represents a 1% decrease on 2021-22 tonnages across all 3 waste streams.

A total of 257 tonnes of bulk waste and 140 tonnes of green waste were collected through Verge Valet this year. Of the material collected, 66% of bulk waste and 100% of green waste was recovered.

### 2022-23 projects

- Preparation commenced for the rollout of the 3-bin FOGO (Food Organics Garden Organics) system including procurement of kitchen caddies and compostable liners, and the development of communications materials.
- We worked with the Western Metropolitan Regional Council to deliver waste education to the community, including 25 workshops, tours and school incursions, and bin tagging for 552 households.
- Council resolved to make the Waste Local Law in March 2023.

Preparation commenced for the rollout of the 3-bin FOGO system.

### Regulatory services

### **SCP** alignment

To work towards the Strategic Community Plan's aspiration of Thriving and Sustaining, the Town's Urban Planning and Development team continue to work diligently in areas including Statutory and Strategic Urban Planning, Building and Compliance services, and Environmental Health.

In November 2022, the Town's Urban Planning and Development team received the Planning Institute of Australia Award for Excellence for WA Local Government Bands 2-4.



# Ranger Services

### **SCP** alignment

The Town's dedicated team of Rangers play a vital role in our community, with the work they do aligning to the SCP's aspiration of 'Connecting'.

Our Rangers play a key role in the management of animals with an ethos of striving to return lost pets to their owners. Town Rangers support the community through these areas:

- · Parking and traffic
- Animal control
- Litter and illegal dumping
- Illegal camping
- Snake handling
- After hours call-outs
- School patrols
- Fire break inspections



### 2022-23 in review

### **Pinforce**

The Town's Rangers department has successfully introduced Pinforce for issuing infringements for parking control, animal control along with other local laws. Rangers received training on the new system to ensure their competency in the daily use of the new technology.

### **CCTV** and community safety

The mobile CCTV unit has been successfully mobilised in known 'problem spots' within the Town. This has helped prevent illegal dumping and damage to property in these areas. The Police have been able to use our CCTV footage to identify known offenders.

### Safety for our staff

Town Rangers now wear body cameras as part of their uniform safety equipment. This has helped minimise the number of verbal abuse incidents from members of the public. The cameras have also proven to be valuable as an accountability tool in the event the Town receives complaints about an Officer's conduct when on duty.

#### **Snake control**

The Town now engages a professional snake removal service on residents' properties to minimise potential snake bites. Using a contractor has proven to be more cost-effective than training Rangers to maintain a sufficient level of expertise in snake control and removal.

#### **Customer Service**

This year has seen a greater focus on high-level customer service to ensure that all complaints are addressed efficiently and professionally. Casual Rangers have become more efficient with Datascape to reliably record information relevant to any complaint.

### Responsible dog ownership

Rangers have been patrolling off and on-lead areas for the safety and benefit of all community members in public areas throughout the Town.

# Community Enrichment



### 2022-23 in review

#### **Access and Inclusion**

The Town's Access and Inclusion Plan 2022 – 2027 was endorsed by Council in September 2022, furthering our commitment to encouraging an accessible and inclusive community for people with disabilities, their families and carers.

### **Journey towards Reconciliation**

Council endorsed the Town's Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) in December 2022. The Town's first RAP received accreditation from Reconciliation Australia in early 2023.

The RAP features artwork by Mosman Park resident Kahlie Lockyer. Kahlie is a member of the Ngarluma and Karriyarra Peoples of the Pilbara Region and the NyulNyul, Yawuru and Jaru Peoples of the Kimberley Region.

#### Vibrant community events

- We hosted several Citizenship Ceremonies over the past year, welcoming 33 new Australians to Mosman Park.
- Our community food truck event 'Sunset Eats' has become a much-loved event in Mosman Park and will continue to run in 2023.

### **Preserving community memories**

- Stolen plaques from Mount Lyall were replaced with etched granite recreations.
- A commemorative plaque was installed at Alf Adams Pavilion, celebrating its namesake.

- Historical pictures and plaques have been installed inside Alf Adams Pavilion so that we can continue to reflect on the history of Mosman Park's community, through its sporting achievement and active RSL.
- Excess pictures and memorabilia that could not fit in Alf Adams are now in the care of The Grove Library, where they will be preserved and displayed as part of a small installation.

### Flourishing community

- The Town's Community Partnership Program continued to help local clubs and community groups grow.
- The Town partnered with Volunteering WA and Mentally Healthy WA (Act-Belong-Commit) to provide support and resources to local sporting clubs and groups.
- Spearheaded by former Councillor Zenda Johnson, Prime Movers (a wellness program) now operates at Alf Adams Pavilion with the support of the Town. This is an opportunity for the older members of the community to stay active and healthy.

## RAC Reconnect – Solomon Street pop-up activation

The Town teamed up with RAC as part of the Reconnect WA project that seeks to revitalise streets and public spaces. The space between Davis and Mann Ovals came a live with a host of activities and a pop-up bike lane that bridges a critical gap in the local path network and paves the way for a vibrant, people-friendly space along Solomon Street. This was an exciting first for Mosman Park that hopes to inspire residents and the local business community to co-design and drive long-term change in their own neighbourhood. The project also allowed the Town to collect valuable data from residents of all ages on common walking/cycling routes throughout the Town.

### Youth-led Placemaking

2022-23 saw the start of an exciting youth-led placemaking project in collaboration with RAC, Better Block and Town Team Movement. We worked with Mosman Park youth aged 16-24 to revitalise an area outside Mann Oval and Alf Adams Pavilion:

- the skate bowl and basketball area was revamped in a sea of colour
- accessible concrete pathways and murals featured throughout
- Wikiblock furniture' was installed as a sustainable and low-cost furniture option
- a launch day event was held with a Welcome to Country, food trucks, activities and musical performances.

This youth-led project is set to run until November 2023.



### **Wellington Wishes**

In our commitment to enabling community-led events, the Town supported Wellington Wishes Town Team to deliver the Seasons Streetings Event in December 2022. The Town Team received Connecting Communities external grant funding.

### **Partnerships with First Nations peoples**

Meaningful events and initiatives to honour and celebrate Aboriginal culture were held throughout 2022-23:

- Australia Day 2023
- Gurangup Park Storytelling and Welcome to Country at Minim Cove
- National Reconciliation Week breakfast at Town Administration
- Installation of yarning circle seating at Mann Oval,
   6 seasons garden and art mural
- Aboriginal storytelling sessions and childrens' activities during May as part of the Solomon Street pop-up activation.

The Town will continue to facilitate respectful conversations and build relationships with local Elders as we journey towards reconciliation and the fulfilment of our Reflect RAP.

#### **Community safety**

The Town continued to strengthen partnerships with WA Police, Department of Communities and service providers. The 'Let There Be Light' solar sensor light initiative helped residents light dark areas throughout the neighbourhood. The Town has also installed solar lighting in some public areas including the Mosman Park Tennis Club carpark.

# Disability Services Report 2022-23

The Disability Services Act 1993 requires local governments to have a Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP).

The DAIP is implemented by not the public authority, but also by its agents and contractors who provide services to the public on behalf of the local government.

The Town's Access and Inclusion Plan 2022-2027 was endorsed by Council on 27 September 2022.

The progress made in these outcome areas by the Town, and its agents and contractors, are detailed below. Outcome 1: People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to access the services of, and any events organised by, the Town of Mosman Park.

Inclusive community events

- Auslan Interpreters and live streaming have featured in major community events.
- 'Wikiblock' furniture designed as part of the Youthled Placemaking project incorporated all-abilities design features to accommodate wheelchairs and prams.

Online booking and other services

 The launch of the Town's ERP now means our residents and community can access greater online services via our website 24/7. Customers requiring specific access needs can choose to organise their requirements online rather than by telephone or attending the administration building in person. Outcome 2: People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to access the Town of Mosman Park buildings, facilities, and infrastructure.

- The Town's Draft Public Open Space Strategy project takes into consideration outcome areas in our AIP.
- Alf Adams Pavilion was refurbished in 2023. The Town expanded the accessible features of the building to include laminate flooring, acoustic ceiling panels and seating. The sound echo was reduced by 70 per cent making meetings and activities more comfortable.

Outcome 3: People with disability receive information from the Town of Mosman Park in a format that will enable them to access the information as readily as other people are able to access it.

- Closed captions are included in visual video content where possible.
- The Town's print and digital materials aim to be as inclusive as possible by being available in a range of formats and communicated through a variety of methods.

Outcome 4: People with disability receive the same level and quality of service as other people from the staff of the Town of Mosman Park.

- The Town's Customer Service Charter was reviewed.
- The Town's Customer Service team readily adjusts to people's unique needs.
- Information relating to translators, interpreters, and assistance with hearing impairment are made available.

Outcome 5: People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to make complaints to the Town of Mosman Park.

- The Town has begun drafting a complaints procedure
- The Town's new online services and the Antenno app offers more methods to provide complaints and feedback

Outcome 6: People with disability have the same opportunities as other people to participate in any public consultation by the Town of Mosman Park.

- The Town's Community Engagement Policy shares the AIP's commitment to be open and inclusive
- Comprehensive community consultation offers inperson opportunities for residents to have their say. Venues are accessible and inclusive.

Outcome 7: People with disability have the same opportunities to obtain and maintain employment with the Town of Mosman Park.

### **Freedom of Information**


The Freedom of Information (FOI) Act 1992 provides the public with the right to apply for access to information held by the Town of Mosman Park.
